What We Do Well

Supplementary Health Coverage

Publicly funded homecare and rehabilitation services

Publicly funded or not-forprofit long-term care

Some subsidies to offset cost of living

> Programs to fund home renovations

Government Service Officers link to elders

What We Need to Improve

Access to help with home & yard upkeep

Local transportation services for seniors

More client-centered home support

Subsidy for low income seniors paying market rent

Safe, suitable and accessible public housing

Affordable housing

More supportive living and long term care

MLAs supported the idea of Seniors' Strategy by passing a resolution in June 2020. Cabinet has Aging in Place as a priority but has not put forward a Seniors' Society.
